POLITE PHRASES

When your guests arrive, you should greet them according to the time of day:

Good morning, sir.
Good afternoon, madam.
Good evening.

If know your guest well:

Good morning, sir, how are you today? Good evening madam, it's nice to see you here again.

If your guest asks you "How are you?" you should reply :

Very well, thank you.

When they leave :

Goodbye, sir.
Goodbye, madam, and we look forward to seeing you again.

If you know the guest well:

Bye bye, sir.

Please and thank you :,

Goodbye, sir, and thank you for coming. We enjoyed the meal very much - Thank you, madam, I hope you'll come again.

Restaurant English

You should use "please" if you want something :

That's (\$28) altogether, please.

If you wish to give something that has not been asked for, don't say "please", but mention what it is:

Here's your bill, sir. Here's your pineapple juice, madam. The soup, sir. If you are giving something that has been asked for :

Could I have some salt, please? - Certainly, sir.

Here you are.

I'd like to see the many Hans you are

I'd like to see the menu - Here you are, madam.

Use "please" when you wish to tell people politely what to do :

Would you come this way, Please?
Please pay at the cash desk over there.
Please help yourself at the buffet table, madam.

Affirmatives

In English, just to say "Yes" often dosen't sound very polite.

Here are some suitable phrases :

We'll be having dinner at 7:30 tonight. - Very good, sir. I'll make a note of that.

Can we dress informally? - Certainly, madam. That will be quite all right.

Do you take traveller's cheques? - Yes, of course, sir.

To a customer you know well:

We'd like our usual table please. - Right you are, sir.

Negatives

And just saying "No" is often impolite, Phrases are :

Could we have a table for seven? - I'm afraid we're fully booked just now, sir.

I'm sorry, but we are closed on Mondays.

Is there a floorshow tonight? - No as a matter of fact. There's, no entertainment on Tuesday evenings, madam.

Do you have oysters on the menu? - Well actually, we don't have oysters tonight, sir, but the crayfish are very good.

Apologies

Polite negatives are often needed when apologizing:

Excuse me sir, but I'm afraid we'll have to move you to another table. This one's already reserved. I'm sorry, madam, but I'm sure you'll understand.

If you didn't understand what a guest said, you can say :

I'm sorry, sir, but I didn't quite catch what you said.

Sometimes guests may apologize to you. You should answer:

Restaurant English

Being helpful:

Good morning. Can I help you?
I'll call you back as soon as I can. (on the phone)
Yes, sir, I'll make a note of that.
One moment, madam, I'll just check.
We'll attend to it right away, madam.

Recommending:

Sometimes guests can't make up their minds. A gentle suggestion may help:

I suggest you try the oxtail soup, madam. I can thoroughly recommend the roast lamb, sir.

Or mention alternatives :

You can either have the set lunch or the a la carte, madam.

Asking for information:

And finally, don't be afraid to ask your guests questions if they seem hesitant. In English, silence is not polite.

What would you like to drink, madam?
And how about a sweet?
What name was it please?
Which would you prefer, sir, the dessert of the cheese board?
Is everything to your satisfaction, sir?

At what time would you like your breakfast?
Would you prefer tea or coffee?
Would you like to have the Continental or the English breakfast?

Useful Phrases - 2

to pay: in cash
by traveller's cheque
in foreign currency

by credit card

Credit cards are not accepted.
We can take a cheque with a banker's card.
Do you want it all on the same bill or do you want to pay separately?
There is a cover charge.
Service is included.
What seems to be the trouble?
I think you'll find that is correct.

Useful Phrases - 3

Have you made a reservation, sir?
Would you like to come this way, please?
May I take your coats?
Would you like a drink before your meal?
Are you ready to order?
What would you like to start with?
And to follow?
How would you like your steak done?

I'm afraid we're fully booked at that time.

Useful Phrases - 7

Is anything wrong, madam? Excuse me, but could you tell me what the trouble is, sir? I'm afraid we don't have any just now. I'm afraid that is not possible, madam. That's rather difficult I'm afraid, sir. We're rather full this evening I'm afraid. I'm sorry madam, but.... I'm extremely sorry to hear that. I'm sorry, sir, but we are obliged to observe the regulations. I'm so sorry, madam, there must be some mistakes. I do hope you will accept our apologies. I do apologize for this unfortunate incident. I'm sure you understand. We'll attend to it right away. we'll certainly see what we can do about it, sir. I'll see that it's changed right away, madam. I'll have it seen to immediately.

<u>Useful</u> Phrases

We offer special menus for different diets. We cater for various religious. We guarantee the meat is pure beef. We have a selection of vegetarian dishes.

SNACKS

A : I'm not very hungry. I'd like a snack.

B: Would you like an omelette, sir?

A : No. I'm tired of eggs.

B: How about the spaghetti or ravioli, sir?

A: Ravioli, that's a good idea. I'll have that.

B: And what would you like to drink, sir?

A: What have you got.

B: We have liqueurs, wines or cocktails. Would you like to try a Mekong Whisky, sir?

A: What's that like?

B: I don't know, sir. I've never tried it myself.

A : All right. Give me a small one.

B: Very good, sir.

ICE CREAM

A: Good afternoon, madam.

B : Good afternoon.

A: What would you like to have, madam?

B : I'll have ice-cream.

A: What flavour would you like, madam?

B: What flavours have you got?

A: We have vanilla, strawberry, chocolate, pineapple, coffee or raspberry.
We also have sundae, banana split, rainbow parfait, ice

cream float and malted milk.

B: Do you have Parfait Glace Au Mocca, don't you?

A : I'm afraid we don't, madam.

B: Well, then I think I'll have rainbow parfait.
A: Very good, madam. Would you like anything else?

B : No. Thank you.

DRINK AND DESSERT

A: Miss. I'd like a pot of tea, please.

B: Indian or Chinese, sir?

A: Indian, please. And I'll have a cake.

B: What kind of cake would you like, sir?

We have chocolate or fruit cakes, pan cakes, pies and French pastries.

A : I'll have a fruit cake, please.

B: Very good, sir. A pot of Indian tea and a fruit cake.

Thank you.

Excuse me, Miss. This tea is very strong.

I'll bring you some hot water. B :

Good. And bring me some more sugar, please. A :

Yes, sir. Right away.

Good afternoon, sir.

B : Good afternoon. Are you still serving lunch?

Yes, we are. Here's the menu, sir. Would you like a drink before lunch?

B Yes, please. I'd like a bourbon with soda.

May I take your order, please? A :

Of course. I'll have sirloin steak. B :

Yes, sir. How to you like it done, sir? A :

Very good, sir. And would you like coffee afterwards?

The shell fish is very good to start with, madam. Or of you like the baby clams or the mussels are also very good.

I'll try the baby clams.

Then we've got fish from the Gulf of Thailand.

That sounds very interesting. What type of fish is it? A :

You can have whiting, catfish, giant sea base, red snapper or white sea perch, madam.

A : Don't you have mackerel?

B : Oh, yes, We have mackerel and tunny, madam.

Ok. I'll have mackerel a la meuniere, please.

Very good, madam.

THAI FOOD

Good evening, gentlemen.

Good evening, Miss. We'd like to try some local food.

Very good, madam. Here's the menu. Can you explain it to us, please. C :

I'll try, sir. This is chicken curry cooled in coconut A : milk. We call it Kaeng Keo Wan Kai. It goes well with fried crisp rice noodles or mee krob. Or if you like sea food, we have Tom yam ka pong, That's sour fish soup.

B : Don't you have beef?

Yes, we do, madam. May I recommend you to try our beef A : chili. We won't make it too hot for you.

C Is that a promise?

A : Yes, sir.

So we'll have some fish soup, fried crisp rice noodles and B : beef chili. And for dessert we'd like local fruit. What fruit is in season now?

Head waiter : I see. There must be some mistake, madam,

Ah. We could give you a pleasant table in the Blue room, though I'm afraid if isn't a

window table.

Woman Well, I suppose we'll have to manage with

that, but I must tell you I'm disappointed

with your service.

Head waiter : I'm very sorry indeed that this should have

happened.

3. Waitress! This meat is like leather! It's Man

enough to break every tooth in your head.

Waitress Perhaps you'd like to change your order,

sir. The sirloin is very ender.

4. Man Waiter, this just won't do. This wine's got

a most peculiar flavour. Yes, sir. I'll take it back. Perhaps you Waiter

would like to choose another wine instead,

sir.

5. Man Three gin and tonic, please.

Waitress I'm sorry, sir, but we're not allowed to

serve drinks before 12 o'clock midday. Would you like me to bring you something else?

Some coffee?

6. Man Waiter, this table cloth is a disgrace. It's

covered with soup stains.

Oh, I'm so sorry, sir, it should have been changed before. If you'll just wait one Waiter

moment....

7. Woman Look at these glasses, this one's even got

lipstick on it.

Waiter I'm very sorry, madam. I'll bring you clean

ones right away.

8. Man Head waiter, I want to have a word with you.

Head waiter : Yes, sir. Is there something wrong, sir?

Man

Something wrong? I should think there is something wrong. My wife and I have been kept here waiting nearly an hour for our

meal!

I'm terrible sorry about that, sir. Our Head waiter:

staff has been kept unusually busy this evening. I'll see to it personally myself. Now, if you wouldn't mind just telling me

what you ordered.

9. Man Waiter, I can't quite understand how you

manage to get 10 marks plus 12 marks plus 65 marks 50 pennies to add up to 177 marks 50

pennies.

Waiter One moment. I'll just check it, sir. You're

quite right, sir. I can't understand how such a mistake could have been made. I do

apologize, sir.

Mr. Radford has just dropped in for a quick lunch :

Waitress : A table for one, sir?

Mr. Radford: Yes, please.

Waitress : Are you having the set lunch?

Mr. Radford : Yes.

Waitress : What would you like to start with?

Mr. Radford: What's the soup of the day?
